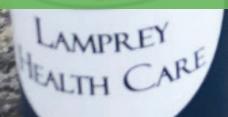

Our patients come from over 40 communities in Rockingham, Hillsborough and parts of Strafford Counties.

Approximately 75% of our patients are at or below 200% of the Federal poverty level.

Across our three centers, 16% of our patients are uninsured.

Leadership Report

When history looks back on 2020, they may refer to it as the year that never was. The COVID-19 pandemic brought much of society to a screeching halt. If two words were overused in the English language during 2020, they were "unprecedented" and "pivot." Still, we found ourselves needing to pivot to ensure we met the unprecedented needs of our patients. "Partnership" was the third word that emerged. In our goal to find innovations, we found effective partnerships with other organizations and communities were essential in providing care.

Changes were necessary, and in some cases, we faced tough decisions. Lamprey Health Care consolidated our Facilities and furloughed many of our staff. We're happy to report most have returned, and we are truly grateful for their ongoing flexibility, perseverance, and commitment to our mission.

It was necessary to change some programs. The operation of our Senior Transportation Program ended in the spring. The Senior Transportation Program was one of the longest-running programs at Lamprey Health Care and deeply rooted in our 50 years of service to the community. We were fortunate to find a new partner in Rockingham Nutrition Meals on Wheels to assume this work in our place. Similarly, others in the community have undertaken the Lamprey Health Care school dental program, which remains on extended hiatus.

While the move away from these services saddens us, we are excited about the innovative patient services that began in 2020. We soon realized that we needed to think outside the exam room and rethink how and where we provided services. The additions of Telehealth, drive-thru Flu Clinics, COVID-19 screening, testing (for our patients and first-responders), and distribution of food and supplies added much-needed supports to the communities we serve. The United Way, regional

Public Health Networks, and End 68 Hours of Hunger were essential partners with us in this work.

Other partnerships and program expansions included a new collaboration with Center for Life Management in Derry, expanding our integrated services model to a new community. We are pleased to partner with an organization similarly focused on access to care and improving health outcomes. We also brought services to the Nashua Soup Kitchen & Shelter, providing a new access point for care delivery and service coordination in their facility. Finally, we expanded our substance use treatment programming to all three facilities and furthered the reach of this valuable resource.

We saw the departure of Marie Ramas, MD (Nashua) and Anjana Neupany, MD (Nashua), while we welcomed John Anderson, MD (Nashua and Newmarket.)

In the face of adversity, we rose to the challenge and not only survived but thrived through the strength and determination of our staff and the collaborative work with our communities and partner agencies. As 2020 closed, we anticipated the arrival of a COVID-19 vaccine. With renewed hope, we eagerly look to 2021 with more answers than questions.

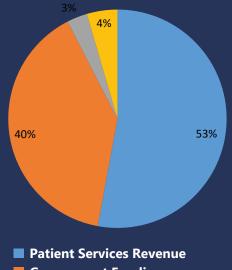

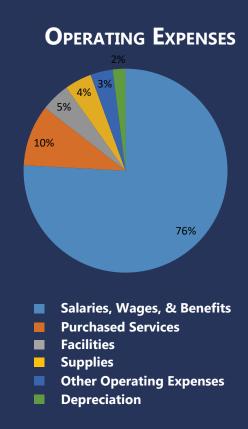
